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## The Legend of Wesak

### From the works of Alice A. Bailey

#### THE LEGEND OF WESAK

"There is a valley, lying at a rather high altitude in the foot-hills of the Himalayan-Tibet ranges. It is surrounded by high mountains on all sides except towards the northeast, where there is a narrow opening in the mountain ranges. Up towards the northern end there is a huge flat rock.

"At the time of the Full Moon in May, pilgrims begin to gather; the holy men and lamas find their way into the valley and fill the southern and middle parts, leaving the northeastern end relatively free. There, so the legend runs, gathers a group of those great Beings Who are the custodians on Earth of God's Plan for our planet and for humanity. The Christian believer may prefer to speak of Christ and His Church, and regard Them as constituting that great Cloud of Witnesses Who guarantee to humanity ultimate salvation. The esotericists of the world may call Them the Masters of the Wisdom, the planetary Hierarchy, Who in Their varied grades are ruled and taught by the Christ, the Master of all the Masters, and the Teacher alike of Angels and of men. Or we can call Them the Rishis of the Hindu Scriptures, or the Society of Illumined Minds, as in the Tibetan teachings.....Their wisdom, love and knowledge, stand as a protective wall around our race, and seek to lead us on step by step, from darkness to light, from the unreal to the real, from death to immortality.

"This group of Knowers of divinity are the main participants in the Wesak Festival. In front of the rock, looking towards the northeast stand Those Beings Who are called by Their disciples the *Three Great Lords*. These are the Christ, Who stands in the center; the Lord of living forms, the Manu, Who stands on His right hand; and the Lord of Civilization, Who stands on His left.

"As the hour of the Full Moon approaches, a stillness settles down upon the crowd, and all look towards the northeast. Certain ritualistic movements take place, in which the grouped Masters and Their disciples of all ranks take up symbolic positions, and form on the floor of the valley such significant symbols as the five-pointed star, with the Christ standing at the highest point; or a triangle, with the Christ as the apex; or a cross, and other well known formations, all of which have a deep and potent meaning. This is all done to the sound of certain chanted words and esoteric phrases called mantrams.

"As all participants raise their eyes towards the sky just a few moments before the exact time of the Full Moon, a tiny speck can be seen in the sky. As it comes ever closer, it grows in clarity and definition until the form of the Buddha can be seen, seated in the cross-legged Buddha position, clad in his saffroncolored robe, bathed in light and color, with His hand extended in blessing. As He arrives at a point exactly over the great rock, hovering in the air over the heads of the Three Great Lords, a great mantram – used only once a year, at the Festival – is intoned by the Christ, and the entire group of people in the valley fall upon their faces.

"This invocation sets up a great vibration or thought current which is of such potency that it reaches up from the assembled group to God Himself. It marks the supreme moment of intensive spiritual

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effort throughout the entire year, and the Spiritual vitalization of humanity and the Spiritual effects last throughout the succeeding months. The effect of this Great Invocation is Universal or Cosmic and serves to link us up with that Cosmic center of Spiritual energy from which all created beings have come. The Blessing is poured forth, and the Christ, as the Representative of humanity, receives it in trust, for distribution.

"So the legend runs, the Buddha returns once a year to Bless the World, transmitting through the Christ renewed Spiritual life. The whole ceremonial Blessing, from the time of the first appearance in the distance until the moment the Buddha fades from view, takes just **eight minutes**. The Buddha's annual sacrifice for humanity (for **HE** comes back only at great personal cost) is over, and He returns again to that high place where He works and waits.

"Year after year He comes back in Blessing; year after year He and His great Brother, the Christ, work in the closest cooperation for the Spiritual benefit of humanity. Through the Buddha, the wisdom of God is poured forth. Through the Christ, the love of God is manifested to humanity. It is this wisdom and this love which pour forth upon mankind at each Wesak Full Moon."

This year the WESAK FESTIVAL FULL MOON occurs on Wednesday, May 14 at 2:16 pm CT. This is an extremely powerful Full Moon, intensifying changes in the electromagnetic fields of the Earth and all of its inhabitants. ## **Steadying the 3-Legged Stool**

In the Spring 2013 *GoodNews* we talked about spring cleaning your finances. We offered six ideas about financial planning:

- Save: pay your self first
- Protect: check your insurance coverage
- Retirement: plan for retirement
- Invest: in your business and in your self
- Needs: needs versus wants is an easy way to budget
- Give: stuff, money, time

We've looked at several of these ideas in depth, and this quarter, our subject is retirement.

"Retirement" is a word that can strike fear in the heart. It also can bring great anticipation. Sometimes, it brings both at the same time!

The fear can be due to a few different things – worry about missing friends from work, about filling one's time, about having *enough* time – but often it's due to worry about having enough money.

"Retirement" is the goal most often mentioned by workers today. What we actually seek, according to financial author Nick Murray, is "the endowment of a long, comfortable, and totally worry-free retirement, with no compromise in lifestyle, and no real concern about ever running out of money."

Where do funds come from to "finance" retirement? The framework for retirement security in the United States is often described as a **three-legged stool: pensions, Social Security, and personal savings.** 

The first "leg" is pensions. If you have a career that provides a pension, congratulations! Most of us are not in that group. Today, about 14% of non-union workers have pensions, and that number decreases every year. In 2005, the average monthly benefit for those who do have pensions ranged from \$650 to \$1400.

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How much does **Social Security** – **the second leg** – provide for retirement? In February of this year the average Social Security retirement benefit was \$1,250.56 per month. **You can click here to set up an account and access your own personal benefit statement.** For most of us, the Social Security benefit is usually a relatively minimal amount, and that is by design: Social Security was intended to be only *part* of our retirement funding. Social Security originally began when workers were age 65, in a time when life expectancy was age 58 for men and 62 for women.

Our personal savings are the third leg in the three-legged stool. This is the factor we can most control and influence, but we tend to save very little. The Employee Benefit Research Institute reported this month that some 36% of workers have less than \$1,000 in savings and investments, including 401(k)s and Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs). About 60% of workers have less than \$25,000 in savings and investments. Of workers who have no 401(k)s or IRAs, 73% have less than \$1,000 in savings and investments.

Fewer than half of us (44%) have even tried to calculate how much we might need to save for retirement. Last year workers 55 and older were surveyed and asked how much money they would need to invest in order to receive additional income of \$500 per month. Most answers were pretty far off the mark: nearly 75% said \$25,000 should do it. In fact, at the generally-accepted planning rate of 4%, \$150,000 is needed in order to draw \$500 per month. If you want to try your hand at figuring what you need, calculators are available here, here and here.

What's the most important thing we can do? Take control where we can: in the area of personal savings. The best (and simplest, and easiest) way to save is to automate it by putting a percentage of each paycheck into savings automatically every month. There are three general ways to do this:

- **401(k):** consider participating in your employer's plan, if one is offered. In a 401(k), for example, your savings will come out of your paycheck and go directly into an investment account, and this also lowers your taxable income. And if your employer will "match" part of your contribution, great!
- IRA: if there is no employer plan, authorize your employer to send a portion of each paycheck directly to your Individual Retirement Account. You can generally open an IRA at a bank, an insurance company, an investment firm, or directly with a mutual fund. Depending on several different factors, an IRA may be deduct-

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ible from your taxes as well, and you may be eligible to contribute to an IRA even if you also participate in your employer's 401(k).

• Savings Account: authorize your bank to move a specific amount or percentage from your checking account each month directly into a savings account. There's no tax deduction for this, but it does help automate your savings.

And one of the newer trends in retirement planning is great news: today, instead of a three-legged stool, we now consider that retirement security is supported by "four pillars," and that fourth area may be **the most useful idea of all for those who are in or near retirement.** 

The "fourth pillar of retirement" is the choices we make, both in retirement and about retirement. Prudential Financial produced a study on this concept in 2008. And one of the best parts of this fourth pillar is that we tend to have a lot of control over the choices we make. This includes choices like:

- When to start retirement
- How to convert assets to income
- Whether and how to work
- How to spend leisure time
- How to allocate assets
- Where and how to live
- When to begin drawing Social Security
- How to provide care for dependents (children and parents)
- Whether and how to access home equity

These ideas and more can give you greater control over your plan for retirement.

# IMPORTANT REMINDERS For All UB Ministers



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### Spring is wedding season!

So if someone has asked you to officiate a wedding ceremony:

- Check your ID card to make sure you are current and active
- Always remember to check with the guidelines in each state and county before you agree to officiate a wedding ceremony
- Contact the Local Bureau/Clerk of Courts office as to whether you are required to register or present a minister's verification letter from the UB administration office
- If a minister's verification letter is required, contact the UB office and we will be happy to send a letter to you
- In <u>some</u> states you can be subject to a fine of up to \$1,000 and up to a year imprisonment for failure to follow certain regulations
- When performing wedding ceremonies, you are the one who must have the marriage certificate signed by witnesses, if required, and/or sign it yourself. This must be done on the wedding day
- You are responsible for sending the marriage certificate within the required time to the Clerk of Courts office/local licensing agency, as required by the local rules. The directions you must follow should be on the license, or call the local county before the wedding day to learn what is required of an officiant

### Thankfully, Personal Challenges Make Us Better Ministers

After 65, most of us expect to "wind down." For some, the road to retirement, especially since the recent economic crunch, has often been a pathway (or waterway) to somewhere else. For my family, Mexico was to be our last move.

Having always wanted to "get back to the ranch," a small ranchette in Central Mexico was the perfect place. I grew up in New Mexico. All our savings went into making the Central Mexico ranchette the best place imaginable. We brought all our worldly goods to the place, including six dogs, four horses, chickens, rabbits, a pool, hot tub, and a greenhouse. We also have countless friends in a nearby city, and 150 economically marginalized kids that my family and I volunteer teach. We have watched the children grow and glow these last six years. Our Mexican friends have become "our family."

However, as we all know, **the only constant in life is change**. As ministers, we must be always ready to handle a new crisis — even our own. Spirit will often give us a personal challenge to overcome just before a series of challenges we are to help others through.

Our crisis is my adored husband's health. Having nearly lost him in 2001 and again 2009, I deeply honor the fact that he is fighting for his life because he is a Purple Heart Vietnam Veteran who has 100% service-connected disabilities. I do understand the military, because my deceased father served in WWII and Korea, my deceased beloved uncle in Vietnam, and my son in the Army. I feel honored to make my husband's life easier.

Unfortunately, what is best for him is not what was in my life's plans. Our tiny ranch is at 6,700 feet in a cool, arid, high desert climate with industry not too far away. The air is dusty and smoggy. In August, seven doctors said that my husband's heart and lung issues have caused him to need warm, moist, clean, oxygen-rich sea level air to have any quality of life. I gasped as we searched the world for the best location for him: it was not in Mexico. It was further south.

He blossomed when we visited Ecuador for five weeks at sea level. He seemed 20 years younger, and looked at least 10 years younger. So our new home is a ninth-story condo, with a view of the ocean on a narrow 10-road-wide peninsula. The air is warm and clean.

What lessons has this transition offered me? After 400 applications for a teaching position with no success — the three places I visited in Ecuador all wanted me to work for them. There also is a school for disabled children in that tiny town; my PhD is in special needs. Unlike most of South America, in Ecuador there are 28 native groups speaking; my doctoral minors are bilingual education and sociocultural studies. This new place is a gold mine of service opportunities. Clearly, it's not just my husband who is blossoming: I also belong here.



Your Ordination was so beautifully written and reflected much of what I felt/feel, especially the day of my ordination. I know how we all have a unique story of how we got to that place where we chose ordination, but I think my own is a fairly unusual story:

I felt like I was getting married that morning as I got dressed in preparation, and I was so emotional. It took me till the evening to finally tune in to why I'd been so emotional throughout the ordination and why it felt like a sacred marriage. I thought about what "marriage" really means — the union of two becoming One — and I realized that it was the formal union between me with the Divine. It was also my formal commitment to the Divine that I was here in service to humanity. I was born knowing I was here in service, but it felt special and sacred to make that declaration formally through ordination. I'd been brought up Catholic and I got to a place where I never wanted to have anything to do with church, priests, ministers and religion....and I used to say I wouldn't touch any of it with a 40-foot pole. And then Rev. Gregory Possman showed up when I attended the Festival of Joy in the interior of British Columbia. We connected, I did his Ascension Process workshop and then got a call from him asking if I would be interested in sponsoring him to Vancouver, BC.

Well, my business partner and I sponsored Gregory to Vancouver twice, and the second time we noticed that his outline of workshops, etc., also said he ordained anyone who was ready. Something spoke to me and I knew I had to look into what that meant and who this UB was. Next thing you know, I had filled in the application and was just waiting for the next time when Gregory would be in my area so I could be ordained.

The shift from "I wouldn't touch church, priests, ministers or anything religious in nature with a 40-foot pole" to "I know ordination is the next step in my soul's journey," came about at the Festival of Joy itself. Not only did I spend four glorious joy-filled days in utter bliss at the Festival, but Spirit challenged my "rejection" of all things ministerial in nature. The joke was on me, it seemed. Every one of the speakers was a minister, and I knew Spirit was testing me. The first speaker looked like what I always had imagined Jesus would have looked like, and when he spoke, his words echoed my own beliefs. After his talk, all I could think about was finding out what church he was a minister with. It was a spiritual organization and he'd been "made" an honorary minister in recognition of his work with them. That seemed acceptable. And then when every one of the other speakers were also ministers, but also echoed my own truth in some way, I knew Spirit was telling me to open my mind and heart to other possibilities. I knew that not every organization connected with a minister and their ministry had to be simply trying to indoctrinate others.

And here it is, 20 years this coming year since I took my **formal** vow to be in service to the brotherhood of humanity. Although I may have had a different kind of "doctor" in mind when I was 2 and told my mum I wanted to be a doctor and make people well, I know this is exactly the "doctor" my Soul had intended.

### Ministry + Reiki

Reiki seems to be a channel of intuitive information that is extraordinarily helpful to me as a practitioner. Clients cannot believe how that energy connection can tell me so much about people I have just met. I am humbled to be God's instrument and I am always clear to people that I am just God's messenger.



# Chaplaincy: Organized Religion and Service

"Why would you want to be around death and dying?"

This is what people asked when I shared that I was in training as a hospice chaplain through the Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) program.

After seven months of hospice chaplaincy training, I can share many areas of growth, but the most relevant to our organization is the religious question: *Everyone wanted to know my religion.* 

I began as the "eclectic" chaplain in a group consisting of a Chabad rabbi, a Baptist minister, a

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Presbyterian minister, and an Orthodox Jewish woman. The supervising chaplains represented diverse backgrounds as well: my mentor was a female Methodist pastor, and others were Unitarian, Buddhist, AME, Church of Christ.

I was the only one with the amorphous spirituality, perhaps questioned in the minds of the others. In my homework assignments I brought in readings from all traditions and indigenous communities. It was part of my stated goal as a chaplain trainee to find/define my spiritual path. Becoming a full-time chaplain requires that I have ordination from a body recognized by the Association of Professional Chaplains as well as endorsement from my affiliate religious group.

Well, what am I? I am a metaphysician, a Reiki Master, and animal communicator who is ordained by UB. I am not very mainstream and my candidacy for any such title is doubtful, given my "freewheeling" spirituality.

I have found, without variation, that every time I introduce myself to patients or families, I am asked one of three questions:

- "what denomination are you?"
- "what is your church?"
- "are you Jewish?"

The first two questions come from Christians who automatically assume when I say "chaplain" that I am a particular brand of Christian. The last one, obviously, comes from Jews who want to make sure I am not imposing an unwelcome faith on them.

I answer them all one of three ways:

- "I am an interfaith minister"
- "I don't have a particular church. I'm comfortable everywhere"
- "I am Jewish but work as an interfaith minister"

Not one of those answers ever stopped me from engaging patients in conversation.

The few times I was not invited in to chat further happened with Catholic families who had already called in a priest, or with Jewish families who had their own rabbi; and even in those cases of people with very specific religious preferences, I would make an offer to call a priest or a rabbi if needed.

Most of the time my own practice never interfered with my work, and a couple of times, my metaphysical practice actually enhanced it. One dying patient told me how she loved Unity, which started a discussion that was right up my alley; and another one said something about Reiki, which led to the two of us doing Reiki together on her mother just before she died.

The woman was so excited about Reiki that she told our team manager, the head nurse, who came looking for me shortly after. It actually worried me, because I thought that I had perhaps done something taboo. Instead, she said, "I didn't know you did Reiki! I wrote my thesis on the use of Reiki in nursing!"

At that moment, I knew that I didn't have to seek a more "mainstream" religious affiliation because I am fine with my beliefs. My beliefs are fully congruent with all the principles of the Metaphysical Churches and Buddhist philosophy and anyone who believes in a higher consciousness anywhere.

If we as chaplains must serve patients where they are spiritually, then the Association of Professional Chaplains should also be able to meet me where I am. I have found that my path is *not* amorphous. I don't need an institutional name and address to be valid.

So in the end, I remain who I am, still exploring for myself, not for any "governing" body, and I'm comfortable with that.
